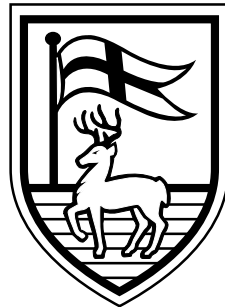

# GENERAL EDUCATION CORE CURRICULUM

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## AREA I: MATHEMATICS AND NATURAL SCIENCES

- 1) Two semesters of mathematics. At least one semester must be a calculus course (MA 19, MA 119, MA 120, MA 145, MA 146, MA 171, MA 172, MA 221, MA 245, MA 273).
- 2) Two semesters of a natural science. Any two courses in any of the natural sciences, as well as AY 110 or PY 261, fulfill this requirement.  
**Note:** Psychology majors cannot use PY 261 to fulfill this core science requirement.

## AREA II: HISTORY, AND THE SOCIAL AND BEHAVIORAL SCIENCES

- 1) Two semesters of history. HI 10 plus one 200-level course. CL 115-116 (Greek and Roman Civilization) may be used to fulfill this requirement.
- 2) Two semesters of anthropology (except AY 110), communication (CO 100 and CO 130 only), economics, politics, psychology, or sociology. Both courses may be in the same department or they may be in two different departments. Also includes ED 241 for Certificate students only.

## AREA III: PHILOSOPHY, RELIGIOUS STUDIES, AND APPLIED ETHICS

- 1) Two semesters of philosophy. PH 101 is required followed by a 200-level course.
- 2) Two semesters of religious studies. RS 101 is required followed by a 200-level course.
- 3) One additional course in philosophy, religious studies, or applied ethics.

## AREA IV: ENGLISH AND VISUAL AND PERFORMING ARTS

- 1) Three semesters of English. EN 11 and EN 12 are required, plus one semester of English literature with a course number between EN 100-199. Writing courses (EN/W) do not fulfill the core literature requirement. Selected courses offering literature in translation may also fulfill this requirement – see listings under classical studies as well as modern languages and literatures.
- 2) Two semesters of visual and performing arts.
- 3) One semester must be in the area of art history; film, television & media arts history; music history; or theatre history. The other semester may be selected from any of the three-credit course offerings in art history; film, television & media arts; music; studio art, and theatre.

## AREA V: MODERN AND CLASSICAL LANGUAGES

- 1) Two semesters at the intermediate level of any language listed among the offerings of the Department of Modern Languages and Literatures or the Classical Studies Program.

# UNDERGRADUATE ONLINE REGISTRATION SCHEDULE SPRING 2016

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**FRIDAY, October 30:** Course booklet goes online (paper copies for faculty advisors).

**MONDAY, November 2 to WEDNESDAY, November 11:** Advising Period and obtain PIN

**THURSDAY, November 12:** Online registration for students classified as seniors – both FT and PT matriculated undergraduates.

**FRIDAY, November 13:** Review by departments and schools and late registration for seniors.

**MONDAY, November 16:** Online registration for students classified as juniors – both FT and PT matriculated undergraduates.

**TUESDAY, November 17:** Review by departments and schools and late registration for juniors.

**WEDNESDAY, November 18:** Online registration for students classified as sophomores – both FT and PT matriculated undergraduates.

**THURSDAY, November 19:** Review by departments and schools and late registration for sophomores.

**FRIDAY, November 20:** Online registration for students classified as freshmen – both FT and PT matriculated undergraduates.

**MONDAY, November 23:** Review by departments and schools and late registration for freshmen.

**MONDAY, November 30:** After Thanksgiving break, online registration system is turned back on for all classes and stays on with waitlist, until add/drop week in January:

8:30 a.m. – Class of 2016

9:30 a.m. – Class of 2017

10:30 a.m. – Class of 2018

11:30 a.m. – Class of 2019

## STUDENTS: HOW TO FIND YOUR FACULTY ADVISOR?

Students can look up the name of their Faculty Advisor through [my.Fairfield.edu](http://my.Fairfield.edu). Click on the Student Tab, and then click “My Academics,” click “Advising” under the Quick Links (left side of the screen). Then click “Advisor Name,” select the current term (for example, 201601 is Spring 2016), and click “Submit.”

# UNDERGRADUATE REGISTRATION PROCESS

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- Students with a financial or Dean of Students hold will not be able to register.
- Students need to see their faculty advisor prior to registration to discuss course selection and to receive their PIN.
- **Students are NOT excused from class to register. This includes cutting class or leaving class early.**
- On-line registration will be by class year: one day for all students in each class to register for his/her courses. Classes will go online in alphabetical groupings starting at 8:30 a.m. on their designated day. Spring Varsity Athletes will precede the alphabetical groupings.
- Students will register for major, minor, core and elective courses on their class registration day and are limited to a maximum of 20 credits.
- The online registration system will be active for each class until 11:59 p.m. Then the student's online registration and PIN will be turned off until Monday, November 30 when add/drop begins.
- There will be a day in between each class registration for departments to review registrations and for students who missed their registration to register in person in the Registrar's Office.
- The University reserves the right to cancel courses for which there are insufficient registration or change time codes or professors as deemed necessary.
- Most courses will be open during the online registration period. Some departments (with courses that have specific populations) may incrementally increase the maximum number of spaces in some of their courses by class.

## ONLINE COURSES

All full-time students classified as Juniors and Seniors are eligible to enroll in **one** online course for the Spring 2016 semester without needing prior Dean's Office approval. Please be aware that online courses are *condensed* (typically only 7 weeks in duration) and therefore *rigorous*. Online courses often have "irregular" start and end dates (sometimes beginning at the halfway point of the semester). As with semester-long lecture-based courses, class enrollment is firmly capped, and availability for full-time Juniors and Seniors is limited. **Note:** The one-course online maximum per semester for full-time students will be strictly enforced. **Any full-time student who registers for more than one online course for the spring semester will be automatically dropped from ALL online courses.** Further, the student will not be permitted to register for additional courses until November 30, after **all** undergraduates have registered.

## WAITLIST COURSES

The waitlist for courses will be turned on at the beginning of online registration, except for courses with maximums that are increased incrementally.

- When a space opens up in a class, the first student on the waitlist will be notified via his/her Fairfield student e-mail account, with instructions on how to register for the waitlisted class. **They will have 24 hours from the time the email is sent to register for the class.** If there is a conflict in his/her schedule, they will have to resolve that issue before registering for the waitlisted class. If they fail to register for the class by the deadline stated in the email, they will be taken off of the waitlist for that class.
- The use of the wait lists and the process of notifying students will run from Friday, November 27 through Friday, January 15. During this period, the Registrar's office will not honor write-ins for closed courses from faculty. The electronic waitlist will be the only mechanism for filling available openings in courses. After January 15, students can register for classes with open seats on a first come, first serve basis. During the Add/Drop period of January 19-25, the Registrar will accept write-ins from faculty for closed courses.

## AUTOMATIC ROLLOVER COURSES

Automatic Rollover Courses are full-year courses that continue from the Fall semester to the Spring semester, typically with the same professor and the same time code. Everyone in the class is rolled. If you wish to change your rollover course, you may change it during your registration period, on a space available basis. Department Chairs can make changes in rollovers as necessary. Professors will announce specifics in class concerning whether their class is a rollover for Spring and what the rollover will be.

**Note:** If you have a financial or Dean of Students hold at the time rollovers are processed, you will not be rolled into the next class in the sequence.

# UNDERGRADUATE REGISTRATION PROCESS

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## DEGREE EVALUATION ON THE WEB

All matriculated undergraduate students have a degree evaluation online, showing the requirement of his/her program, including core, majors, and minors. To run a degree evaluation on **my.Fairfield.edu**:

- 1) Go to the home page of **my.Fairfield.edu**
- 2) Click on the blue button with the graduation cap that says “Degree Eval”  
This will take you directly to your degree evaluation.



The Class of 2016 will continue to use “CAPP” – the same format that you have used in the past. The Classes of 2017, 2018, and 2019 will use “Degree Works” that was rolled out last year. Students should print a degree evaluation and bring it with them when they meet with their advisor.

## DIRECTIONS FOR STUDENT SELF-SERVICE REGISTRATION SYSTEM

Student Self-Service accounts are accessed through **my.Fairfield.edu**. Every student has an account on this system. If a student needs assistance with his/her NetID or password, they should contact the Help Desk at (203) 254-4069 or ext. 4069 on campus. After logging in to **my.Fairfield.edu**:

- 1) Click “Student” tab, Select Registration
- 2) Click “Add or Drop Classes” in the Quick Links area (left side of screen)
- 3) If prompted, go through the steps for Electronic Promissory Agreement
- 4) From the Term Code drop-down menu in the Promissory Agreement Term choose the term for which you are registering, click “Submit”
- 5) The Electronic Promissory Agreement may appear. If so, read and understand the agreement and click “I Agree” if you agree to the terms.
- 6) Beneath, click the words “Registration Form” to display the Registration Term screen
- 7) From the dropdown menu “Select A Term” choose the term for which you are registering, click “Submit”
- 8) In the Alternate Pin field, enter the PIN provided by your advisor, click “Submit”

### To Add a Class

#### If you already know the CRN

- 1) Click on “Add/Drop Classes” (in the Quick Links on the left side of screen)
- 2) Scroll down to Add Classes Worksheet
- 3) Enter CRN, or multiple CRNs one per field, of the 10 blank fields available
- 4) Click “Submit Changes” button beneath
- 5) The page will refresh and display the status of each class in the Current Schedule area

**Note:** If there is a problem with the registration, a section titled **Registration Add Errors** will appear below and explain the error.

#### If you do not know the CRN

##### Basic Search – default view

- 1) Click “Search for a class” in Quick Links area or Class Search button at the bottom of the page
- 2) From the dropdown menu “Select A Term” choose the term to search, click “Submit”
- 3) In “Look Up Classes” – Click to select the desired Subject from the alphabetical scrolling list
- 4) Click “Course Search”
- 5) Courses in that subject area are listed, with View Sections buttons to the right
- 6) Click the “View Sections” button for a course to view the availability

**Advanced Search** – used when looking for all courses related to a specific subject area required by a course, or a specific subject, time slot, etc.

- 1) Click “Search for a Class” in Quick Links area or “Class Search” button at the bottom of the page
- 2) From the dropdown menu “Select A Term” choose the term to search, click “Submit”
- 3) Without choosing a subject, scroll down to the bottom of the page and click “Advanced Search” to display numerous criteria to search
- 4) The more criteria that are chosen, the narrower the list of results

# UNDERGRADUATE REGISTRATION PROCESS

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**Viewing the Search Results.** The search results are displayed with column headings.

- **Select:** Square indicates an available course/section, **(C)** indicates closed section
- **CRN:** Identifies the CRN (Course Reference Number) if you should need to note it
- **Subj:** Subject area
- **Crse:** Course number (including preceding “0”)
- **Sec:** Section identifier
- **Days:** Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, ThuRsdAY, Friday, Saturday, SUnDy
- **Time:** Time the course meets
- **Cap:** Seat capacity
- **WL Cap** or **WL Rem:** Waitlist Capacity or Waitlist Remaining seats
- **Instructor:** Instructor’s name, if assigned
- **Location:** Building and Room, if assigned

## Selecting the Class

- 1) Click the Check Box of the desired class in the Select column
- 2) Scroll to the bottom of the page and click the **Register** button in the lower left corner. You will be returned to the Add/Drop Classes page.
- 3) The status of the class is listed the Current Schedule area

**Note:** If there is a problem with the registration, a section titled **Registration Add Errors** will appear below and explain the error.

## Dropping a Class

- 1) If a course needs to be Dropped, click “Add/Drop Classes” from the Quick Links
- 2) Scroll down to Current Schedule
- 3) In the Action column select Drop/Web for course to be dropped
- 4) Scroll to the bottom of the page and click “Submit Changes.” You will be returned to the Add/Drop Classes page.

## Waitlist: To Place a Class on Waitlist

- 1) Search for the class. Once displayed, determine by viewing the **WL Rem** (Waitlist Remaining) column where a number greater than “0” indicates a waitlist is available.
- 2) Write down the CRN number
- 3) Scroll to the bottom of the page. Click “Register.” You will be returned to the Add/Drop Classes page.
- 4) Scroll down to the Add Classes worksheet
- 5) Type in the CRN you wrote in to one of the 10 blank fields
- 6) Click “Submit Changes”
- 7) A registration Add Errors section will appear
- 8) Select Waitlist under the Action column
- 9) Click “Submit Changes”

**Remember to add labs when necessary.** If a student does not have a computer with Internet capabilities, they can use one in the computer labs, the library, or the Dolan School of Business. If a student needs assistance with registration, they should contact the Registrar’s Office at 203-254-4288 (or x4288 on campus). **They SHOULD NOT call the Help Desk.**

**Remember, any student with a Financial or Dean of Student’s “HOLD” will not be allowed to register.**

## INTERNSHIPS

Internships provide the opportunity for practical experience in a career field related to a student’s major. Most departments and programs in the College of Arts and Sciences offer credit for internships in appropriate agencies and business firms in Fairfield, nearby communities, as well as New York City and New Haven. **SPECIAL COURSE DESCRIPTIONS FOR WATER FOCUSED COURSES**

**CH 83** - The chemical and physical properties of water are explored throughout the semester and, since the majority of common chemical and biochemical reactions occur in aqueous solution, the water molecule is front and center in the course. Students finish the class with a sound understanding and respect for water's importance on Planet Earth.

**ID 395** - This 3-credit interdisciplinary undergraduate seminar course is open to students throughout the University who are working independently on semester long research projects focused on water. Structured to augment the research, students will work with faculty in their disciplines as well as participate in three round-table lecture seminars and bi-monthly class meetings and attend two Water Theme events.

**ME 347** - This course covers topics related to fluid in static condition (swimming pool, reservoir) and fluid flow in motion (river, pipes and pumps).

**ME 353** - This course focuses on mathematical modeling of fluid flow in static and motion.

**MG 300** - In this course students will develop strategic management projects. Some of the companies chosen have been Consolidated Water, American Water, Aqua America, Connecticut Water, Dow Water, Evian, Nestle, Aquifina, Dasani and SeaWorld.

**SA 101** - The course will focus on learning the basic techniques of digital imaging and artmaking while exploring the theme of water.

**SA 134** - The course will focus on learning the basic techniques of digital photography while visually exploring the theme of water.

**SA 136** - In this introductory course, all aspects of water will be explored using various bookmaking and photographic techniques.

# NEW COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

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## **AY 399 – Independent Studies in Anthropology**

Independent studies experiences provide intellectually curious students with opportunities to take the reins of their education, and delve deeply into the ideas and subjects that truly inspire them. Upon request and by agreement of an individual professor in the department, students undertake a one-semester independent study on a defined research topic in anthropology. Prerequisites: Permission of Instructor. Three credits.

## **BL 100A – Special Topics: Black Lives Matter**

In the context of Ferguson, Charleston and other national crises, this course responds to the call of students from our campus community to raise questions about and critically reflect upon the failures of democracy to recognize the value of Black Life. This course employs collective thinking, teaching and research, to focus on questions around race, structural inequality, and violence. It examines the historical, geographical, cultural, social, and political ways in which race has been configured and deployed in the United States. Various faculty bring to bear their respective scholarly lenses so that students understand race and racism across intellectual disciplines. Three credits.

## **CL 199A - Special Topics: Ancient Historians as Literature**

In Classical antiquity history was a branch of literature, and a number of historians rank among Greece and Rome's greatest writers. Ancient history, like the epic tradition that stands behind it, is rich in striking actors, dramatic anecdotes, and powerful speeches. This course will focus on the literary dimensions of the works of Herodotus, Thucydides, Sallust, Julius Caesar, Caesar Augustus, Livy, Plutarch and Tacitus, with particular attention to the delineation of character, narrative structures, the rhetoric of the embedded speeches, and authorial voice. Prerequisites: EN 11 and EN 12 or equivalent. Three credits.

## **CO 245 – Identities, Discourse, and Social Change**

Grounded in the premise that identities are inseparable from communication, this course focuses on the negotiation of, and the discursive practices pertaining to, social identities by exploring the intersections of ethnicity-race, gender, sexuality, social class, ability and age. Given that individual- group differences matter, this course addresses social issues and concerns by concentrating on how structures of power and privilege shape understandings of salient social identities within the United States. Additionally, this course will raise questions about the role of communication research in fostering social change. Prerequisite: CO 100. Three credits.

## **EN 100C – Special Topics: Ancient Historians as Literature**

In Classical antiquity history was a branch of literature, and a number of historians rank among Greece and Rome's greatest writers. Ancient history, like the epic tradition that stands behind it, is rich in striking actors, dramatic anecdotes, and powerful speeches. This course will focus on the literary dimensions of the works of Herodotus, Thucydides, Sallust, Julius Caesar, Caesar Augustus, Livy, Plutarch and Tacitus, with particular attention to the delineation of character, narrative structures, the rhetoric of the embedded speeches, and authorial voice. Prerequisites: EN 11 and EN 12 or equivalent. Three credits.

## **GD 201 – Graphic Design I**

In today's world, we are literally surrounded by graphic design, from billboards to soda cans, from Facebook pages to political ads. The graphic designer develops engaging material that communicates a pointed message and persuades an audience. This class focuses on the basic ingredients of graphic design: typography, image, and color. We further explore the combination of these elements into compositions, utilizing proximity, alignment, contrast and repetition. We engage in the complexity of the creative process, developing a strong designer's process, working both by hand and on the computer. Being critical of design is an essential element of designing. Therefore, we will analyze designs for their efficacy, as we lay the foundation for further study in graphic design. In addition to personal sketchbooks, we will use Adobe Photoshop, Illustrator, InDesign and AfterEffects software. Prerequisites: Completion of VPA core from approved list. Three credits.

## **GD 202 – Graphic Design II**

In this course will address the relationship between the graphic designer and the client. What can a designer do when the client specifies a "cleaner" logo? How can a designer respond when a client says, "I don't know what I want, but it's not that"? We will practice essential research and analysis skills, as well as the questions that designers can ask clients, to help both parties understand the goals of any given design. We will also examine the variety of delivery systems for graphic design, from printed to electronic media, and how they affect both layout and file formats. We will continue to develop expressive skills using text, image and layout. We will also continue to engage in the complexity of the creative process, developing a strong designer's process, working both by hand and on the computer. We will also continue to develop our design sense by critically analyzing designs. Prerequisites: Completion of VPA core. Three credits.

## NEW COURSE DESCRIPTIONS *(continued)*

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### **HI 297 – Power, Politics, History: US-Latin America**

In this course, students examine the political, economic, social, and cultural repercussions of U.S.-Latin American relations from the mid-19th century to the present. We will study cases of overt US political intervention and conflict, as well as less dramatic but ongoing forms of influence. While we will seek to understand what has led the United States to intervene so frequently in Latin America, our work will also pay close attention to the multiple ways that social actors throughout the Americas have constructed their national and cultural imaginaries across time, and in dialogue with one another. Prerequisite: HI 10. Three credits.

### **HI 256 – Introduction to Public History**

This course presents the field on Public History, which is the application of academic historical knowledge for presentation to the general public in a manner that enhances the public's understanding of historical change. It gives students the skills to think about and write local history, by exploring the bases for historical analysis through evaluation of primary-source documents and familiarity with secondary historical interpretations. Through service-learning projects, students will serve community partners such as the Fairfield Museum and History Center, the Bridgeport Public Library Historical Collections, and the Barnum Museum, by contributing historical research, designing exhibitions, and preparing curriculum lesson plans. Prerequisite: HI 10. Three credits.

### **HI 265 – History of Indian Subcontinent**

Faced with unrivaled questions of diversity, poverty, and scale, South Asia has been a crucial laboratory in the making of political modernity. India, with a population numbering over a billion, is the world's largest democracy. Pakistan was the world's first Muslim "homeland" and "nation." Beginning with an examination of the colonial period, this course reconsiders partition, and then follows the postcolonial trajectories of India, Pakistan, and Bangladesh. We explore innovative and divergent imaginations of the future, and of democracy in particular. We encounter Hindu nationalists, communists, socialists, liberals, anarchists, Islamists, and Muslim nationalists, revolutionaries, and the inescapable Mahatma Gandhi. Prerequisite: HI 10. Three credits.

### **HI 346 – Saints, Sinners, and Sisters: Women and Religion in American History**

Why have women comprised the majority of American religious groups? What sorts of gender structures are central to religious groups in America? How have women's relationships to religious institutions changed over time? This course spans from the colonial era to the twentieth century; this course will focus on key periods in the formation of American women's relationship to religious ideas and institutions. Topics include: Native American women and colonialism; Puritan Women, Quakerism, Witchcraft Accusations, Evangelicalism American Catholic Life, Black Churches, Social Movements, Spiritualism, the Mormon Church, Jewish Women in America, Fundamentalism, Muslim Women, Modern Witchcraft, Goddess Movements, and Buddhism. Prerequisites: HI 10 and one 200-level course. Three credits.

### **PH 282 – Violence and the Sacred**

Is religion essentially violent? How have religious principles been used to justify abuse? Who suffers the physical and spiritual effects of this hostility? What actions might we take in response to such suffering? This course examines the intersection of violence and the sacred, especially as it has emerged and been confronted within the Catholic/Christian tradition. Attention is paid to the works of both traditional and feminist philosophers. Possible topics include – child abuse, domestic violence, and racial violence. Prerequisite: PH 101. Three credits.

### **PH 272 – Philosophy of Film**

Philosophy of film is one of the leading branches of philosophical aesthetics. While informed by and partly related to disciplines such as film studies, film theory, and film criticism, philosophy of film privileges a cognitive approach to the interpretation and study of film, an approach according to which film might be seen as doing philosophy per se, thus providing an original contribution to the overall philosophical panorama. The course begins with a critical overview of the most significant ontologies of film. Such a discussion is then followed, in the second and third units, by the exploration of issues pertaining to both the tradition of film studies and to the aforementioned cognitivist tradition. Among the issues considered, specific attention is given to the question of narrative, to emotions and film, and to the relation between fiction and nonfiction. A last unit will instead open the discussion to the relation between film and television and, more speculatively, to the future of film in the age of digital technologies. Prerequisite: PH 101. Three credits.

### **PJ 101A – Special Topics: Black Lives Matter**

In the context of Ferguson, Charleston and other national crises, this course responds to the call of students from our campus community to raise questions about and critically reflect upon the failures of democracy to recognize the value of Black Life. This course employs collective thinking, teaching and research, to focus on questions around race, structural inequality, and violence. It examines the historical, geographical, cultural, social, and political ways in which race has been configured and deployed in the United States. Various faculty bring to bear their respective scholarly lenses so that students understand race and racism across intellectual disciplines. Three credits.

**PY 332 – Special Issues in Women’s Mental Health**

This course provides an in-depth exploration of factors specifically related to the mental health of women. Female development, the impact of societal expectations on women’s functioning, and factors associated with women’s coping will be considered, as will the impact of trauma and violence on women’s mental health. The course will also include an in-depth examination of clinical disorders including depression, anxiety, eating disorders, personality disorders, and PTSD, as they manifest in women, as well as postpartum depression and postpartum psychosis. Treatment, resilience and coping will also be discussed. Open to senior psychology majors. Permission of the instructor required for junior psychology majors. Three credits.

**RS 360 – I’m Spiritual, not Religious: The American Spiritual Tradition**

This course examines a strand of anti-institutionalism in American religion, one, which has culminated in the increasingly popular and ubiquitous phrase, “I’m spiritual, but not religious.” The claim to spirituality, but not to religiosity, has a rich history in the United States context, beginning in the earliest periods of European settlement. In this course, students will investigate the evolution of this thoroughly American phenomenon across U.S. history and through the examples of spiritual Americans. Students will consider whether the phrase, “I’m spiritual, but not religious,” though often intended as a statement of one’s separateness from religious institutions, has become the marker of a distinctive religious affiliation. Prerequisite: RS 10 or RS 101. Three credits.

**SA 101 – Introduction to Digital Tools in Art Making**

Introduction to Digital Tools in Art Making: In this introductory studio course, students will explore digital graphics software and how it may be used in conjunction with traditional art media (such as painting and drawing in pencil, ink, charcoal, pastels, and gouache) to develop a unique visual voice. Through projects that build on one another’s idea-based and technical components, students will develop an understanding of vocabulary fundamental to visual language and technology’s relationship to art now and throughout history. Projects will emphasize that digital technology is not an end in itself, but a means to realizing ideas. Prerequisites: None. Three credits.

**SO 194 – Sociology of Education**

This course introduces students to sociological perspectives on education. We will focus on the structure, practices, content, and outcomes of schooling in contemporary society. Throughout the semester, we address three fundamental questions. What are the primary goals of American education? Why are there systematic patterns of race, class, and gender inequality in education? How can we use the sociological lens to understand, contextualize, and alleviate educational problems in the real world? Drawing upon readings dealing primarily with American education, we discuss how educational experiences influence important life outcomes including lifetime earnings, health status, and interaction with the criminal justice system. Prerequisites: None. Three credits.
