UNIVERSITY CORE CURRICULUM

(Class of 2022 and earlier)

Area I: Mathematics and Natural Sciences

1. Two semesters of mathematics.
 - At least one semester must be a calculus course (MA 0016, MA 0119, MA 0120, MA 0145, MA 0146, MA 0171, MA 0172, MA 0221, MA 0245, or MA 0273).
2. Two semesters of a natural science.
 - Any two courses in biology, chemistry, or physics, as well as AY 0110, AY 0115, and PY 0261, fulfill this requirement. Psychology majors may not use PY 0261 to fulfill this requirement.

Area II: History and the Social and Behavioral Sciences

1. Two semesters of history: One 100-level course plus one 200- or 300-level course.
 - CL 0115 and CL 0116 may be used to fulfill this requirement.
2. Two semesters of anthropology (except AY 0110 and AY 0115), communication¹, economics, politics, psychology (except PY 0261), or sociology. The two courses may be in the same department or two different departments. Also includes ED 0241 for Educational Studies minors only.

¹ The following communication courses may be used toward the core requirement in Social and Behavioral Sciences: CO 0100, CO 0130, CO 0200, CO 0202, CO 0220, CO 0233, CO 0238, CO 0239, CO 0240, CO 0241, CO 0242, CO 0246, CO 0248, CO 0323, CO 0326, CO 0338, CO 0340, CO 0341, CO 0343, CO 0347, CO 0348, HS 0200.

Area III: Philosophy, Religious Studies, and Applied Ethics

1. Two semesters of philosophy: PH 0101 plus one 200-level course.
2. Two semesters of religious studies: RS 0101 plus one 200-level course.
3. One additional course in philosophy, religious studies, or applied ethics.

Area IV: English and Visual and Performing Arts

1. Three semesters of English: EN 0011, EN 0012, plus one 100-level English literature course.
 - Writing courses (ENW) do not fulfill the core literature requirement. Selected courses offering literature in translation may also fulfill this requirement; see listings under Classical Studies and Modern Language and Literatures.
2. Two semesters of Visual and Performing Arts.
 - One semester must be in the area of art history; film, television, and media arts history; music history; or theatre history. The other semester may be selected from any of the three-credit course offerings in visual and performing arts.

Area V: Modern and Classical Languages

1. Two semesters at the intermediate level of any languages listed among the offerings of the Department of Modern Languages and Literatures or the Classical Studies Program.

UNDERGRADUATE REGISTRATION PROCESS

- Students with a financial or Dean of Students hold will not be able to register.
- Students must meet with their faculty advisor prior to registration to discuss course selection and to receive their PIN. A student's faculty advisor is listed on their degree evaluation.
- Undergraduate students should register for all courses on their class registration day and are limited to a maximum of 20 credits. Most courses will be open during the online registration period.
- The University reserves the right to cancel courses for which there are insufficient registration or to change meeting times or professors as deemed necessary.
- **If a student chooses to drop a class and later changes their mind, or if they are removed for non-payment, they will *not* be guaranteed a place in the same class.**

Course Schedules

The live schedule of all courses is available online at fairfield.edu/registration > Browse Classes. The online registration portal contains the most up-to-date information regarding course meeting times, instructors, and enrollment status.

Advanced Search options are available, such as browsing by subject, department, college/school, or attribute. Attribute search is useful for finding courses that fit various criteria, such as diversity requirements, interdisciplinary minors, residential colleges, and service learning.

Administrative staff may also use the Banner report SZRSTRT to print a full list of courses, while advising staff and faculty may use Degree Works or the [Course Search](#) app in Stag Center. Degree Evaluation on the Web: Degree Works

All matriculated undergraduate students have a degree evaluation online showing the requirements of their program, including core, majors, and minors. To run a degree evaluation from my.fairfield.edu, search and click on the Degree Evaluation task:

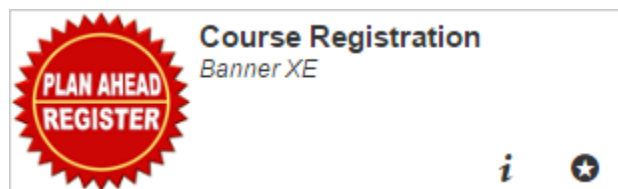


Students should print a degree evaluation and bring it with them when they meet with their advisor, or be ready to display it on their personal laptop or tablet device.

Diversity Courses

Students may search by Attribute to view courses that fulfill the core requirements in U.S. Diversity (**UDIV**) and World Diversity (**WDIV**) using the Advanced Search function in the Banner 9 Registration System.

Independent Study

Independent studies are available in most majors and programs. Students wishing to pursue an intensive research or other academic experience must consult first with a sponsoring faculty member.

Internships

Internships provide the opportunity for practical experience in a career field related to a student's major. Most departments and programs offer credit for internships in appropriate agencies and business firms in Fairfield, nearby communities, as well as New York City and New Haven. Majors who wish to take advantage of these opportunities should consult their department chair or program internship coordinator about eligibility requirements and other details.

New Courses

Several new courses have been approved and will be offered for the first time in this semester. Course descriptions for these and all other courses are available by clicking on the course title in the online registration system.

Online Courses

All full-time students are eligible to enroll in **one** online course per semester without needing prior Dean's Office approval. First-year students may not enroll in online courses during their first semester.

- Part-time students are not restricted to one online course. Exceptions to the one-course limit for full-time students may be made only in extenuating circumstances and must be vetted through the academic dean.
- Please be aware that some online courses are condensed (typically only seven weeks in duration) and therefore rigorous. Online courses often have irregular start and end dates (sometimes beginning at the halfway point of the semester). As with semester-long lecture-based courses, class enrollment is firmly capped, and availability may be limited.

Residential Colleges

Dr. Aaron Van Dyke, Academic Chair, will contact residential college students regarding registration.

Students may search by Attribute to view courses that are open to Residential College (**RCOL**) students using the Advanced Search function in the Banner 9 Registration System.

Service Learning

Service Learning is a kind of experiential education that connects classroom learning with community service. In collaboration with community organizations, students learn about and apply tools of the academic discipline and specific course concepts in their service experiences. This combination enhances academic learning and civic awareness while also providing a meaningful service to and with the community. Course credit and grading are for the learning, not for the service. The service activities for the course are similar to the readings, lectures, class discussions and other assignments; all are contexts for student learning.

Students may search by the following attributes using the Advanced Search function in the Banner 9 Registration System:

- SERL** Service Learning: All students in the course are required to participate in service learning.
- SERO** Service Learning Option: Students have a choice to participate in service learning as a final project and/or in lieu of another comparable project.

Waitlist Courses

The waitlist for courses will be turned on at the beginning of online registration.

- When a space becomes available in a class, the first student on the waitlist will be notified via their University Gmail account with instructions on how to register for the waitlisted class. **Students will have 24 hours from the time the email is sent to register for the class.** If there is a conflict in their schedule, the student will have to resolve that issue before registering for the waitlisted class. If the student fails to register for the class by the deadline stated in the email, they will be removed from the waitlist for that class.
- Waitlists and the process of notifying students will run through Friday, August 23. During this period, the Registrar's Office will not honor permissions from instructors for closed courses. The electronic waitlist will be the only mechanism for filling available openings in closed courses. After August 23, students may register for classes with open seats on a first come, first served basis. During the Add/Drop period of September 3-9, the Registrar will accept permissions from instructors for closed courses with the approval of the appropriate department chair and/or assistant dean.
